Result Areas Coordinated strategies for a common agenda to achieve collective results

Youth & Family Health

WeGo Together for Kids and partners support West Chicago families to pursue and continue to improve their physical health and emotional well-being. This incorporates a diverse set of activities that address health and resiliency, includina:

- Mental health services and awareness raising
- School and community based lifestyle opportunities for healthy eating and physical activity
- Mentorship for middle school students
- Afterschool programming providing relevant activities

- Parenting support and education including for new and expecting parents
- Doula services
- Child development
- Nutrition education and support

Many of WeGo Together for Kids partners provide these services directly and others refer families to other organizations to supplement their own support to families. Healthy West Chicago, a collaboration focusing on healthy living among all community members, is a key contributor to this area, both as a member of WeGo Together for Kids and as a convener of community organizations around health and nutrition.

A key example of collaboration this year has been an intentional engagement of public, nonprofit and faith-based organizations to bring expanded mental health services to the community in partnership with District 33's community schools efforts. This year, the mental health clinician team was fully staffed, and there has been an increase in those served and strengthened collaboration among the partners involved. Mental health clinicians provide counseling to students and families in District 33, meeting families in the school, in the community or in client homes.

Academic Achievement

Work in this result area focuses on providing afterschool and enrichment opportunities for students in preschool through the twelfth grade, in addition to adult education activities such as language classes. This supports students and families, holistically contributing to students' academic achievement and ensuring parents are set up to support their own and their children's success. This year,

activities included after school programming for children and youth, storytime, support to parents for preschool enrollment and kindergarten readiness, English and Spanish language classes for parents and community members, and musical education.

This spring, many organizations continued their support to students and families in this result area throughout the pandemic,

shifting gears to connect virtually over diverse platforms and by phone. This provided students with stability as they were able to continue to connect with programs and supportive adults. In some cases, activities became less focused on the enrichment activity, providing a formal or informal check-in for students and their families and providing families with information and resources to better use technology needed for virtual learning.

Stable Families

The aim for this result area is that West Chicago families are economically stable. For WeGo Together for Kids, this means that households spend less than 30% of their income on monthly housing costs. Organizations focus on providing direct assistance and resources, as well as referring families to community resources, information and services. The ultimate goal is family stability and empowerment of families to take ownership and be able

to navigate resources and processes in the long-term. This in turn contributes to children's success both inside and outside the classroom. This year partner activities included case management, referrals to food pantries, financial literacy, legal assistance, donated school supplies and books, information for enrollment in public assistance programs, home repair, affordable and healthy food education, and holiday food baskets.

Community Engagement

WeGo Together for Kids partner work in this area focuses on West Chicago families having a sense of belonging within the community, being informed, invested and building their community. There are a broad range of activities that contribute to community engagement, including partner participation in community festivals and events, organizational events that celebrate participant milestones within programs

or their own lives, back-toschool events, parent workshops, holiday programming, partner trainings, and a parent leadership group.

Work in this area also includes civic engagement and activism. WeGo Together for Kids and partners have voiced a commitment to equity during the pandemic and during the protests around systemic racism and injustice. Work throughout



the year included engaging community members in critical conversations and supporting community mobilizations calling for adequate safety measures for essential workers during the pandemic.

Early Childhood

Partnerships in this result area help families and children, 0-8 years old, build strong relationships through access to play and learning opportunities. It includes formal and informal learning and development opportunities for young children, therapeutic play, family play groups and parent support groups, home visiting, parent-child workshops, and early childhood music programming.

Over the last year, partners within this result area have come together to solidify a vision and strategies to realize that vision. They have worked to ensure alignment of efforts at both the community and county levels. Partners have planned and developed a community survey to gather input from parents on strengths and needs within the community as related to young children and their development.

COVID-19 Response

West Chicago was one of the hardest hit communities in DuPage County during the COVID-19 pandemic*. Partners mobilized to address increased need while shifting gears to work remotely when possible and ensure the safety of program participants, clients, staff and volunteers when in-person programming was needed. The network worked together to provide a wide array of support and services to meet emergency needs and other challenges

families faced in this new reality. Activities include case management, mental health support, financial assistance, food drives, delivery of essential supplies, as well as testing and contact tracing. For students and families social emotional support was provided, as well as help navigating virtual learning platforms, information sharing, and formal and informal check-ins with families.

Emergency Preparedness

Over the last year, partners have trained community members in mass casualty, first-aid, and using and maintaining fire extinguishers. They have also successfully run school safety and fire evacuation drills at all schools within the community and worked with schools to ensure school safety plans are updated.

Back to School Event

In August 2019, we hosted our fourth annual Back to School event. This year we grew the event to include District 33 schools and partners to share information with families about starting off the school year. More than double the amount from last year, 640 individuals attended and 448 District 33 students received new school supplies!

Humanitarian Service Project

In December 2019, 238

District 33 students received

a bag full of wrapped presents from the Humanitarian Service Project. St. Andrew Lutheran Church graciously hosted the successful event.

Hablemos/Let's Talk

In January 2020, Hablemos/

Let's Talk! kicked off by bringing together native Spanish speakers and native English speakers to practice and learn from one another. Hablemos builds language skills and bridges the community so people don't just live next to each other, but can live with each other! Developed by District 33 parents in partnership with Literacy DuPage and People Made Visible.





COVID-19 Impacts Us All

In May and June 2020, when COVID-19 began to disrupt West Chicago, WeGo Together quickly pivoted efforts to respond directly to families being impacted. Financial assistance for household bills and a home delivery system of care packages became the newest initiatives.

virtually. We also began
hosting our first ever virtual
self-care meetings for
partners and the
community. Participants

meditations.






Pollapalooza

Success Story

Collaboration

Teen Parent Connection provides parenting support services for young parents in West Chicago and DuPage County. The agency's partnership with WeGo Together for Kids has been key in expanding available resources to those families. "We strategically place our parent support groups in communities where we can serve the most families, including West Chicago. Our partnership is important so that we know what other services are available in that area."

WeGo Together for Kids is a collaborative space that includes resource sharing, particularly at its monthly meetings where

partners can develop relationships. Teen Parent Connection has invited partner organizations to provide specialized presentations to their parenting groups.


